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Step back in time with Overture Center's Duck Soup Cinema silent film series

Featuring lobby acts, vaudeville and live accompaniment on the historic Grand Barton Organ

Madison, Wis. (Nov. 7, 2025) — Get ready to relive the magic of silent cinema and indulge in laughter, music and nostalgia with Overture Center's <u>Duck Soup Cinema</u>. The three-show series begins with "<u>For Heaven's Sake</u>" **on Saturday, Nov. 22** with shows at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. in the

historic Capitol Theater.

Duck Soup Cinema has become a cherished tradition at Overture Center, celebrating the legacy of the Capitol Theater's silent film heritage. Born from the vision to bring the Grand Barton Organ back into the spotlight, the series began as the Sounds of Silents before evolving into its current form in 2004. Each year, 2-5 films are presented with live accompaniment from a skilled organist, whose performance mirrors the emotions of the actors, just as it did when the theater first opened in 1928. Duck Soup Cinema is curated by James Kreul. Jelani Eddington and Clark Wilson are the featured organists, and Joe Thompson is emcee.

Harold Manners Mission—much to Manners' dismay—until a chance meeting with Brother Paul's charming daughter, Hope (Jobyna Ralston), changes everything. With love in the air, Manners hatches a hilarious plan to pack the mission with visitors. Lloyd's first feature for Paramount Pictures, this 1926 gem was a box office smash in its day—and still delivers big laughs nearly a century later.
